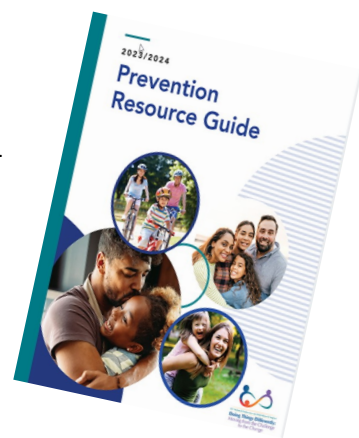
Child Abuse Prevention Month

Every year, Child Abuse Awareness Month is observed in April to recognize the efforts made by our communities and families in bringing up this issue in front of the world. Did you know that every one out of seven children in the U.S has experienced physical and sexual abuse? During this month, as well as the whole year, citizens are encouraged to raise the issue of child abuse and the well-being of children and families around the country.

The first National Child Abuse Awareness Month was declared by President Jimmy Carter in 1979. The declaration was given through the efforts of Child Help founders Sara O’Meara and Yvonne Fedderson. After 4 years, April was formally established as the Child Abuse Prevention Month by President Ronald Reagan. The U.S Department of Health and Human Services requests the communities to actively take part in preventing child abuse and be supportive of the well-being of families. **The 2024 theme is, “Building a Hopeful Future, Together.”**

Preventing child abuse is an individual and a community effort. If you are looking for other resources you may wish to download the Prevention Resource Guide from

The 2023/2024 **Prevention Resource Guide** recognizes that there are actions we can take as a society and within communities, organizations, and families to address the root causes of child abuse and neglect. The prevention resource guide seeks to highlight the innovative ways that communities around the country are doing purposeful prevention work to help children and families thrive. The protective factors have always been central to the Resource Guide. A protective factors approach focuses on positive ways to engage families by emphasizing their strengths, in addition to identifying areas where they have room to grow with support. Focusing on protective factors helps children, youth, and families build resilience and contributes to positive outcomes.

Attention HS Juniors!

This is the time of year high school juniors students around the country are preparing to take standardized tests.

Armed with this knowledge, students, parents, and teachers can then begin to chart courses of study to enhance the student’s ability to demonstrate his or her knowledge on the SAT or ACT for college admissions.

Students in the 11th and 12th grades will take one of two tests: SAT or the ACT. Both of these tests are used by universities and colleges to determine a student’s readiness to do college level work. These two tests are very different and students should consider carefully which best suits their learning styles.

Summer Camp Registration

With summer camp just around the corner, many families are starting to think about and plan for summer care. Registering for care at Child and Youth Programs (CYP) has **changed**. **Here’s what you need to know!**



1. Create an account and select login information at www.militarychildcare.com.
2. Specify your childcare needs — children’s names and ages, dates of needed care, and the installation where care is needed. This will place your child(ren) on the appropriate waiting list(s).
3. Initial placement offers will begin April 1st. Monitor correspondence from Military Childcare daily. You are required to respond to this e-mail **within 48 hours**. If not, your request for childcare will be deleted from system.
4. Once you have been notified that space is available, come to the appropriate CYP facility to complete the hardcopy registration. Be prepared to present birth certificates, proofs of income, (fees are based on household gross income), immunization records, etc.



We are here to meet your childcare needs. Plan now for your entire family to enjoy the warm, fun-filled days of summer.

Autism Acceptance Month (AAM)

The Autism Society of America, the United States' oldest leading grassroots autism organization, is celebrating Autism Acceptance Month (AAM) in April 2024. This month was previously known as Autism Awareness Month, but the Autism Society is taking to social media to assist it in changing the title to Autism Acceptance Month.

In 1970, the organization launched an ongoing national effort to promote autism awareness and to assure that all autistic people are able to achieve the highest quality of life possible. The first annual National Autistic Children's week commenced in 1972, which evolved into AAM. This campaign was designed to "provide information and resources for communities to be more aware of autism, promote acceptance, and be more inclusive in everyday life." With the prevalence of autism in the United States rising from being 1 in 125 children (2010) to 1 in 59 children (2020), the need for AAM is greater than ever.

Christopher Banks, President and CEO of the Autism Society of America, put it like this: "While we will always work to spread awareness, words matter as we strive for autistic individuals to live fully in all areas of life. As many individuals and families affected by autism know, acceptance is often one of the biggest barriers to finding and developing a strong support system." 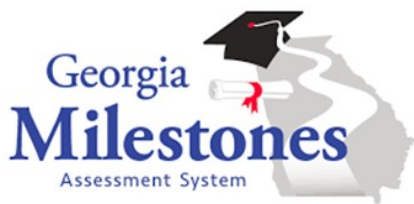

Summer meal programs, including the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) and the Seamless Summer Option (SSO) within the NSLP, present the opportunity to help alleviate summertime food insecurity and positively impact children's growth and development by offering nutritious meals and encouraging children to develop healthy habits at a young age. YIKES, Testing Time is Near!



The faculty, staff, and administrators of Camden County Schools, like other educators around the nation, are working diligently to prepare students for the season of state-wide standardized testing **throughout April AND May.**

The Georgia Milestones Assessment System (GMAS) is a comprehensive summative assessment program that spans all three grade levels – elementary, middle, and high school. The system is designed to determine a students' preparedness for the next level, be it the next grade, course, or endeavor, such as entering college or beginning a career after leaving the K-12 educational system.

This assessment is designed to inform educators about how well students are mastering the core content in the areas of English language arts, mathematics, science, and social studies, and provides students with critical information about their own achievement.

Georgia Milestones is administered primarily on the computer and includes the following features:

- Technology-enhanced items in all grades and courses,
- Open-ended (constructed response) items in English language arts in all grades and courses,
- A writing component (in response to passages read by students) at every grade level and course within the English language arts assessment,
- A reported Lexile score based on the English language arts assessment in all grades and courses, and
- Estimated norm-referenced performance ranges for all grades and courses.

TIPS FOR TACKLING TEST ANXIETY

The second semester of the school year brings with it the demands of standardized testing. For high school students this could mean end-of-course tests (EOCT), Advanced Placement (AP) exams, the SAT, or the ACT. Elementary and middle school students are making final preparations for end-of-grade (EOG) tests known as the Georgia Milestones (visit the Georgia Department of Education at www.gadoe.org for details). Sometimes, the mere idea of the test can be overwhelming. Parents and students alike can follow a few simple suggestions for keeping test anxiety down and energy up for the “big test.”

For Parents:

1. **Develop a study plan** — Don't let them cram! Studying like crazy for days or even the night before can leave your child exhausted and more stressed. Studying is more effective if done over several weeks. Help them make a plan to study in small ‘chunks’ over a longer period of time.
2. **Find practice tests** — As part of your study plan, find sample questions for you and your child to review together. Knowing the format and style of the test can help familiarize your child with the tests and ease his or her ‘fear’ of the test.
3. **Protect bedtime** — Lack of sleep can result in fatigue and can contribute to lack of attention during the test. Be sure your child begins going to bed on time days before testing starts and continues through the testing period.
4. **Offer a healthy breakfast** — Blood sugar is at its lowest in the morning. In order to think and problem-solve effectively, students need to refuel. Remember, a “good breakfast” for one child may not be the same for another. Find out what works best for each of your children.

For Students:

1. **Read test instructions** — Often students are in such a hurry to finish the test, to ‘get it out of the way,’ that they fail to read the instructions. Take the time to know exactly what is required and do just that!
2. **Look over the test** — By taking just a brief moment to look over the test, you can avoid surprises and decide how to tackle the test. Previewing also insures that you will finish in the time allotted.
3. **Jot down notes** — Jotting down brief notes right away can help you feel less anxious about a forgetting important facts or key information. Some students write down formulas or critical dates in the margin as soon as they receive their paper test. You can do the same even if you are taking an electronic test.
4. **Answer easy questions first** — Getting the easier questions out of the way will not only build your confidence, but it will free up time to focus on those more difficult areas of the examination.
5. **Outline thoughts before writing** — Students who organize their writing responses before they start typically score higher. Having a plan or even a short outline insures a well-structured response which hits all the main points.
6. **Talk to someone** — You're not alone! Your parents, teachers, and other caring adults are here to help you succeed. Remember, there are Military and Family Life Counselors (MLFC) available to help you deal with any stress you may be feeling during this time. Talking to an adult or close friend will give you some of

The revamped FAFSA form – also known as “Better FAFSA” – takes many students less than 20 minutes to complete and can unlock up to \$7,395 in federal aid that does not need to be repaid to help cover the cost of college.

2024–25 FAFSA® Form Launch

The 2024–25 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA®) form is now available. You can complete the form to apply for financial aid to help pay for attendance at college between July 1, 2024, and June 30, 2025. We may initiate pauses for site maintenance and to make technical updates as needed to provide you with a better experience.

What's New



The 2024–25 FAFSA form expands eligibility for federal student aid, including Pell Grants, and provides a streamlined user experience. An estimated 7.3 million students from low-income backgrounds will be eligible to receive Federal Pell Grants due to updates to student aid calculations. Videos are available to answer many of those Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ).

What Happens After You Submit

When you submit your completed 2024–25 FAFSA form, you'll get an email confirming that we received your form with preliminary information related to your eligibility for federal student aid. This will include your estimated Student Aid Index (SAI) and estimated eligibility for Federal Pell Grants.

You can also check the status of your FAFSA form at any time by logging in to StudentAid.gov and selecting your processed FAFSA submission from the "My Activity" section of your account Dashboard. The ability to make corrections to processed forms will be available later in March. Headed to college? Get started!

Department of Education — “Better FAFSA” Resources

The U.S. Department of Education is making transformational changes to the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA®) form. The FAFSA form is an application that students and families need to complete to apply for federal student aid, such as federal grants, work-study funds, and loans. Completing and submitting the FAFSA form is free, and it gives students access to the largest source of financial aid to help pay for higher education.

The Better FAFSA is simplified, redesigned, and streamlined. It is faster and easier to fill out, with most students and families completing it in less than 15 minutes. It ensures 665,000 more students will receive Federal Pell Grants to pay for college. Additionally, more than 1.7 million more students will receive the maximum Pell Grant.

Thanks to the overhauled FAFSA form, the majority of income data now comes directly from the IRS, which will not need to be verified. This year's reduction in verifications will reduce the burden for colleges and students while continuing to protect against fraud.	The Department will, through Sept. 2024, waive the requirement for institutions to recertify eligibility for federal student aid programs no later than 90 days before their Program Participation Requirement expires. This flexibility will give time back to institutions at this critical moment.	The Department is posting new data and resources to help schools drive FAFSA completion. For example, the Department released data by high school on their students' 2024–2025 FAFSA submissions, two months ahead of schedule.	The Department conducts program reviews to confirm colleges meet requirements for institutional eligibility, financial responsibility, and administrative capability. The Department will suspend new reviews through June 2024, except for the most serious issues, helping colleges focus on getting aid award offers to students.

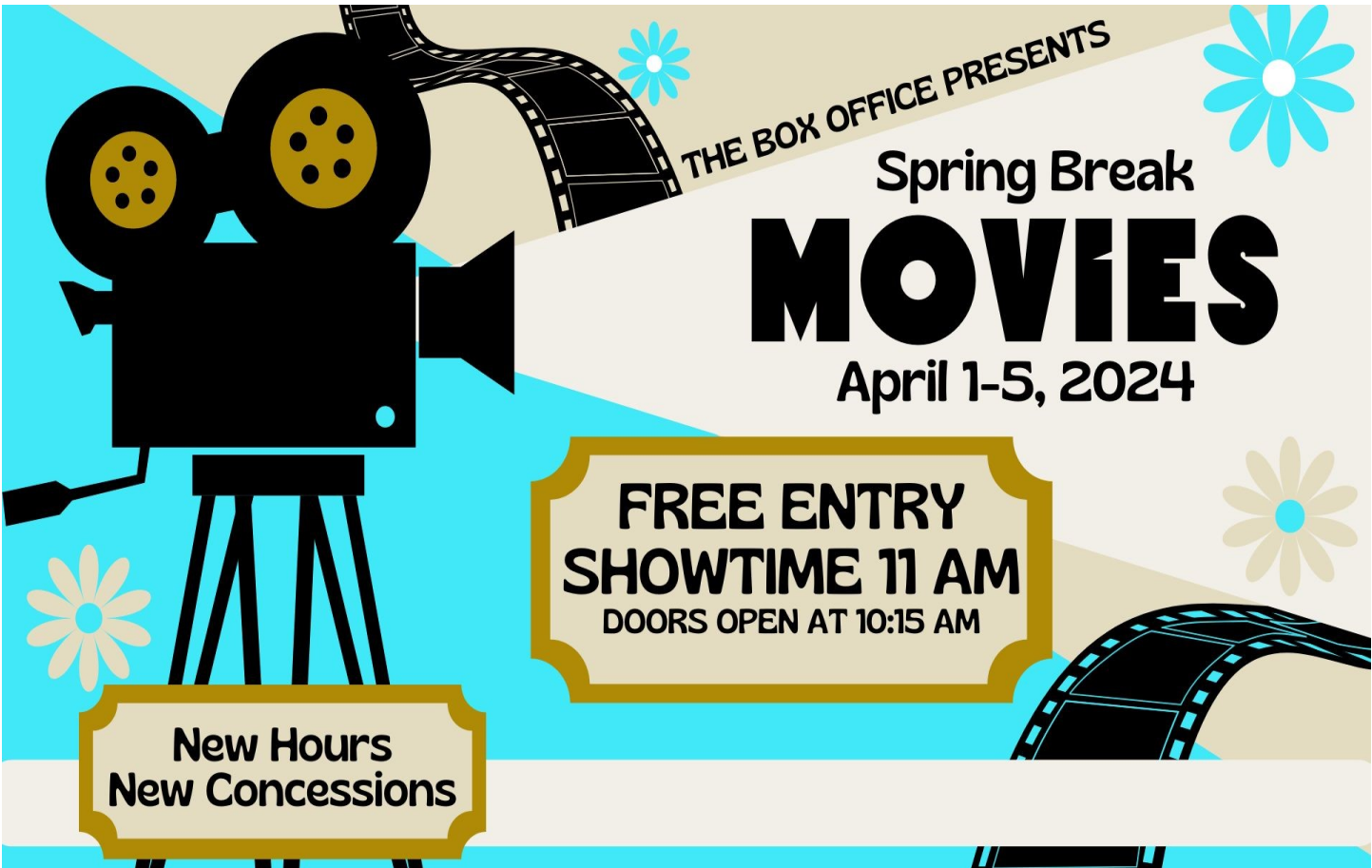

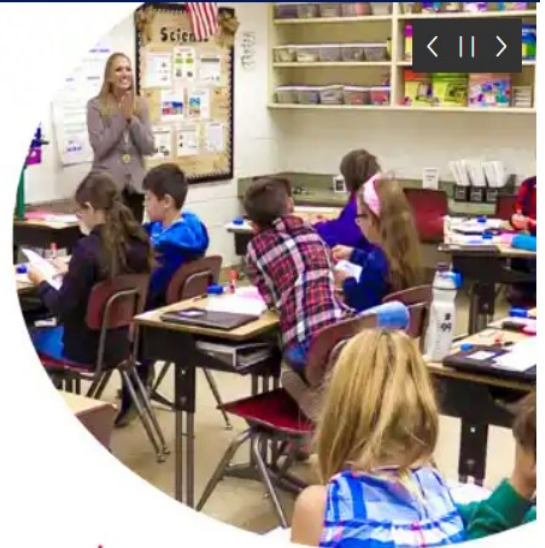

Kings Bay Teens Hit Scholarship Homeruns



Growing up in Mobile, Ala., during the Jim Crow era, Hank Aaron and his siblings faced many obstacles, yet they found a way to persevere.

Those challenges continued as Hank and his brother Tommie signed contracts with the Braves and climbed the ladder to the major leagues. As Hank surpassed Babe Ruth to become baseball's home run king in 1974 and was later elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1982, there were many people he could look back upon as having helped him reach the sport's pinnacle.

Years after his playing career ended, Aaron still recognized that there are many young people who need that helping hand to give them a boost in their lives. With that, he and his wife Billye began the Hank Aaron Chasing the Dream Foundation in 1994. More than 20 years later, the Aarons' foundation has awarded hundreds of scholarships to underprivileged youth from across the United States, enabling them the assistance necessary to help fulfill their dreams.

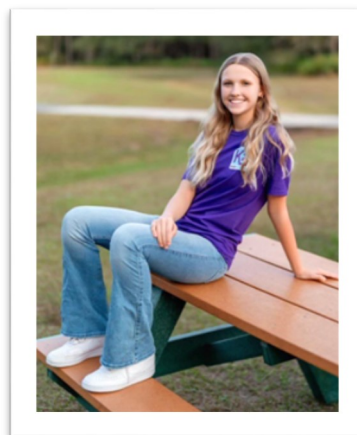
"Our intent was to encourage youngsters to dream a dream and then do what we could to help that dream take root and grow," Billye Aaron told a crowd at Alabama's Tuskegee University in 2003.

In 2009, the Boys & Girls Clubs of America partnered with Major League Baseball to create the "44 Forever" program. This initiative, which runs in perpetuity, received an endowment from MLB and is administered by the Boys & Girls Clubs of America. Forty-four members of the Boys & Girls Clubs of America receive scholarships worth up to \$2,500 a piece. The individuals come from all over the United States and are known as "Dream Chasers."

This year the Kings Bay Teen Program is proud to recognize three outstanding Club members received the Hank Aaron Chasing the Dream Scholarship. Each year these Club members will receive thousands of dollars each year until they graduate from high school to help them chase their dreams of higher learning and athletic achievement.
